Attendance

If you have watched or listened to the news recently, you will have heard that school attendance is a hot topic at the moment. Since the Covid-19 outbreak there has been an understandable drop in attendance rates with many whānau isolating and taking a cautious approach to returning back to school. There is now a significant national focus on improving attendance rates and getting students back into the classrooms. This is a tricky space to operate in as at the same time there is a drive to get students back in front of the whiteboard, there are also some clear expectations that students and staff stay away from school when they are unwell. In the first instance I believe it is important for whānau to have accurate attendance information.

Parents can access their child's attendance information via the HERO app by clicking on your Child's picture. If you need any further information please contact the school office.

The Ministry of Education's benchmark for reasonable attendance is 90%. This may seem high, but when this is extrapolated over a number of years it can have serious implications on how well a student achieves at school. 90% attendance means that a child has 1 day off per fortnight. In one year of school this is 20 days. Over 13 years of schooling this is 260 days, which is more than a year of schooling! The figures get quite alarming as the average attendance rate drops. At 80% a student is away at least one day per week, which equates to 2.6 years away from school. At 70% attendance, a child would miss close to 4 whole years of school! Schools, along with parents and guardians, are legally responsible for making sure students attend school. For a school this means we must:

- record and monitor attendance and absence data
- follow up on absences
- report to whānau if there are attendance issues
- work to improve attendance


