### Happy Friday everyone!

What a couple of weeks it has been for Aotearoa and the world! I am happy to report that things have been pretty settled at Tua Marina School and we have been able to get on with learning with very little Covid-19 disruption.

It has been great to see the students using the outdoor spaces as much as possible. Rewarewa has even set up their own outdoor marquee learning zone- or maybe they are setting up camp to protest? I must go down and check what they are really up to!

The pool has been a real hit and I am so pleased to see teachers taking structured swimming lessons as well as letting the students just have a good old fashioned splash around. The pool heat pump has made a massive difference to how long we are able to extend the swimming season and all going well we will be swimming up until the end of the term.

Next week all classes will be launching into our first integrated unit of work. The Big Idea for this unit is "Beyond Aotearoa". Students will be learning about society and communities and how they function. They will also learn about the diverse cultures and identities of people within those communities and about the effects of these on the participation of groups and individuals. Inquiry in the Social Sciences is also informed by approaches originating from such contributing disciplines as geography, history and economics. The teaching team has been sharing what they will be focusing on and I can not wait to see what our Tua Marina School ākonga (learners) will be learning. Some of the topics suggested are:

Looking at Blenheim's Sister City, Where do the RSE workers come from?, War, Celebrations and Festivals around the world, food from different cultures, what are the different religions?, fashion through the ages, where did civilisation start? Wow- there are some big questions in there!

I am sure by now you will all know of someone within your whanau, work or friend circles who has caught Covid-19. Cases in Marlborough are increasing everyday and it is just a matter of time before we will start to see cases emerge in our Tua Marina community.

The staff team have been planning for a number of scenarios should we have to deliver learning both on site and online. We have Chromebooks all ready to go for our year 3-8 students and we are working on hard material packs that could support home learning for our students in Ti kōuka (Year 1-2).

One of the scenarios that we are planning for is having a number of teachers away from the school either self isolating or unwell with Covid-19. If this situation eventuates it would be fair to assume that we would also have a number of students who were also isolating or unwell. This would mean that in order to keep the school open we would have to combine onsite classes. Ie- If we have 3 teachers available and 75 students onsite, we would have to move students out of their normal class. It would be helpful if parents and caregivers could start having some general conversations with their children to prepare them for any disruption to normality that might be coming our way.










## MATHS



There has been a rumour going around... that students don't really need to learn their basic addition facts or times tables in Modern Maths Classroom. This is definitely FAKE NEWS

Basic facts knowledge is a small **but critical** part of our Maths learning. One of the most important concepts in the junior class is **patterns to ten** - these can be practised at home using dice, fingers, toys... anything that is countable.

The next critical piece of instant knowledge is <u>number pairs that add to</u>

10. Without thorough mastery of these facts, kids struggle as they start to tackle subtraction, word problems, and problems with bigger numbers.

1+9 2+8 3+7 4+6 5+5 ... all add to 10

these facts seem obvious to us but that's because we know them and use them without conscious effort.

Games and activities that reinforce these facts move children away from using their fingers to add and subtract, and help them split and rearrange numbers in their heads. YAY!

So here is an easy game....

- A pack of cards with the picture cards, jokers and tens removed. Ace is used as 1.
- Deal out 10 cards in a row, face up.
- Players take turns to pick up 2 or more cards that add to 10.
- Winner has the most pairs.
