Our School Attendance is going up. Over this term so far we are averaging 66% of our students regularly attending school, 90% of the time or more that is. This time last year it was only 32%. Keep up the great work Team Tua Marina. Attendance has such a massive effect on learning and achievement not only for individual students but collectively across each classroom. With a focus on being here when well we hope to see even better learning and progress over the year. Our school goal is 70% regular attendance by the end of this year.

If you are dropping off or picking up your child(ren) from the school in one of the carparks please remember for support them actively between the vehicle and the gates. Our carparks are busy places that we need to keep safe and we really appreciate working together on this ensuring they stay safe.

The smell of sausages wafting into the office signals again the great support our PTA offers our school. #### **MATHS**

Students are beginning to learn their tens and ones place value. Students have also been reminding themselves of the symbols and meaning of halves and quarters.

#### WRITING

The students have been focusing on writing more than one sentence. This helps them to understand that capitals are at the beginning of every sentence, and not just at the beginning of every story. We are also focusing on leaving a big space between every word, and remembering that lowercase letters are mainly used in our writing.

#### **READING**

The students focus on their own reading levels and progress at varying paces. As a class, we have been looking at what happens when 'two vowels go walking, the first one does the talking' (the first vowel says its name). Fundamentals in next week at Stadium 2000. Ti Kōuka and Makomako will have fundamentals together Tuesday the 11th, and Friday the 14th. Please be prepared by sending your child to school with a large lunch, a full water bottle, togs, towel, a wet bag and a warm jersey. 
We can do hard things! Hard things are often worth doing!

We have also been doing fun things this week like finding out about our ancestors and writing direct speech for animals. Check out BBC animal talks and the animal comic strips of Alex Raphael.


Everyone handed in their homework and EVERYONE improved their basic facts in their test today! Wahoo!!
