#### Maths





This is a way to reward those of you who work hard to rid the country of these introduced species. The competition will run from 26th September - 17th October.

Here are the categories you can enter.

Heaviest possum	Photo must include the student participating and the possum on a scale with the weight clearly visible.
Most possums	Photo must include the student participating and the possum(s) with a date stamp attached to the photo from the camera/phone.
Longest rat	Photo must include the student participating and the rat ruler with the length (end of tail to nose) clearly visible.
Most rats	Photo must include the student participating and the rat(s) with a date stamp attached to the photo from the camera/phone.
Most mice	Photo must include the student participating and the mouse or mice with a date stamp attached to the photo from the camera/phone.
Royal Flush	This award is for any student that can catch a possum, rat, mouse, hedgehog and a mustelid (ferret, stoat or weasel). Photo needs to include the participating student and the pest caught with a date stamp attached to the photo from the camera/phone.

As you need to send in photographs to confirm your catch, we are running the competition based on <u>INTEGRITY</u>, a value we promote at school. We would appreciate that there are no pests counted more than once or dodgy measurements.
